Objective: The workshops, following the three themes of the plenary session, will be informal and interactive. Delegates representing academia, business and government will be pre-assigned (while allowing choice) to each workshop with a mix of viewpoints and experiences that will help to drive the discussions and practical outcomes. Each workshop will have a facilitator and recorder. Discussions and feedback from AAC 2014, with brief progress reports of current projects will be included in these workshops. The workshops will identify current gaps, opportunities and priorities and recommend these to the AAC plenary session following. The workshop reports and proposals will include priority programs, teams, and funding sources. The proposed projects will be developed further and considered in a competitive call in September for seed fund support (probably 2 projects per session funded and lead by AAUN subject to quality, feasibility and funding). The purpose of the workshop sessions is to develop an academia-business-government teamwork around a continuing Australian African program with distinct capacities, focus and characteristics. The proposed projects will deliver mutual benefits to Africa and Australia, and deliver evidence based options to form or improve relevant policies.
