Outcomes

We expect this Members Day to establish new alliances, opportunities, programs and projects for our members. A report will go to the <u>Annual Conference and AGM</u> in Perth on 4 September 2017 to be enhanced by AAUN's broader Australian and African membership.

Some of the newly developed program concepts may qualify for submission to the <u>AAUN</u> <u>Partnership and Research Development Fund</u> which offers seed fund grants of up to \$10K for a year to build the program. The annual call for proposals opens in October 2017 at the AAUN website.

Participants

All attendees today are from AAUN member universities and encouraged to engage in the discussions so that we achieve consensus and outcomes that place AAUN in the most competitive position in delivering research and education outcomes, mobility and exchange instruments, partnerships with members and external agencies, and the attraction of sustainable funding. We create new opportunities for emerging and established researchers, Australia Award holders and alumni.

Focus

This is a time of substantial and rapid change. At a policy level, we should work with the framework of the Sustainable Development Goals and the COP Climate approach, as well as with Australian and African policy priorities.

In our 5th year AAUN works to implement new strengths and reach new members and leadership. What are the needs of our members, and the best way that AAUN can support their success? Our major program areas (see below) must all be globally competitive and locally effective to contribute and to attract sustainable resources:

- Environment
- Agriculture
- Food and nutrition security
- Higher education and institutional development
- Public health in non-communicable diseases
- Entrepreneurism, employment and economic development

Format

Session 1

A continuation of 3-4 min presentations, focusing on emerging mutual interests. This session focuses on institutional development, education, employment and entrepreneurship.

- Current and future AAUN programs
- Development of the next AAUN strategic plan in changing times
- Cooperation of AAUN with other networks (WUN, ARUA, British Council, ACU, RUFORUM)
