Concept Note and Programme

Theme: Sustainable Development in Action – The 2030 Horizon and the Role of Higher Education

**Concept Note**

Almost eight years have passed since the international community agreed to take bold and transformative steps to achieve the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development; a plan of action to secure the rights and well-being of everyone on a healthy, thriving planet. Currently, a year into the second half towards 2030, that promise is in jeopardy and a fundamental shift is needed – in commitment, solidarity, financing, and action – to put the world on a better path. While the links between higher education institutions, networks, and development are clear, the many opportunities the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) offer also come with their own constraints and challenges.

A strong trajectory of enquiry have been in action since the 1987 Brundtland Report; now integrated with the development agenda. The ambition of the 17 SDGs is to address multidimensional and interacting inequalities by enhancing people’s capabilities and ensuring that everyone has equal access to opportunity and choice, while at the same time protecting the environment and planet. Progress toward achieving the SDGs, however, has been unsatisfactory. At the halfway mark of the 2030 Agenda, there are several lessons to be learned. These are presented in numerous high-level documents, notably the 2022 Global SDG Report, and the 2022 UN Africa SDG Report.

At its core, the 2030 Agenda is aimed towards the 5Ps - *People, Planet, Prosperity, Peace and Partnership* to contextualise and focus the development agenda. A particular focus on *Partnerships* is essential to enable synergy in attaining and escalating the impact of the other dimensions. The Partnership dimension centres the role of the AAUN as a collaboration facilitator, ensuring additionality of development work of its members, and beyond.

**People**

Only by achieving Goals 1 (No Poverty), 2 (Zero Hunger), 3 (Good health and Well-being), 4 (Quality Education) and 5 (Gender Equality) can humans fulfil their potential in dignity and equality in a safe and healthy environment.

**Planet**

In order to ensure the safety of the planet as well as the capacity to support the current and future generation, Goal 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation), as well as Goal 12 (Responsible Consumption and Production), Goal 13 (Climate Action), Goal 14 (Life Below Water) and Goal 15 (Life On Land) are dedicated to the well-being of the planet as well as other species that inhabit the planet.

**Prosperity**

If Goal 7 (Affordable and Clean Energy), Goal 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth), Goal 9 (Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure), Goal 10 (Reduce Inequalities), Goal 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities) can be achieved, a sustainable and prosperous world for all would be guaranteed.

**Peace**

Determined to foster peaceful, just and inclusive societies (Goal 16) which are free from fear and violence, there are still opportunities for progress towards the 2030 Agenda with commensurate focus to provide justice and peace for all.

## Partnership

In order to achieve an inclusive and sustainable global community, governments, corporations, universities as well as the citizens must work together towards Goal 17 (Partnerships) to improve the current state of the world we are living in.

Exacerbating the challenging progress towards the goals, are the series of interlinked global crises – the COVID-19 pandemic, conflict, the climate crisis, and a weak global economy. In addition, the two recent conflicts - Russia-Ukraine and Israel-Palestinian create immense uncertainty. Even before the events of the past three years, trust in public institutions had been declining, and changes in the world of work, globalisation, and technological breakthroughs – which raise aspirations, but also fears – brings additional challenge dimensions. There is a narrowing window of opportunity over the next six to seven years to redouble efforts to eliminate poverty and hunger, advance gender equality and overcome the triple planetary crisis.

*In this context, the AAUN Africa Forum will examine how African and Australian Higher Education systems are transitioning and contributing towards achieving sustainability. Their pioneering work of new practices, and their education of future generations, are giving sustainable universities a special ability to create and influence change. An emerging future dimension for the AAUN will be collaborative/comparative education, teaching, and curriculum reform for concerted effort toward 2030. The effective implementation of sustainability policies in universities is highly dependent on various policy and practice approaches, but there is a lack of systematic effort in how best to map this interaction.*

The Forum will consider progress and success, and determine potential levers of change for knowledge networks, especially the AAUN, to position and direct for transformative change and impact in the remaining six years.
